Their commitment is incredible and you, as parents, must be very proud of them. We are proud to announce that we have achieved a further award this term: the RE Award. We are the first within this geographical area to achieve this Award and very few schools nationally have passed the criteria, let alone at the GOLD standard that St Thomas More School achieved. It reflects the excellent provision in all aspects of the RE curriculum and the spiritual ethos that pervades the school. My thanks go to Mrs Lovesey, Head of RE, for her hard work in leading the school to this success, and of course to the students who were interviewed by the Examiner. The external assessor was so enthused by some of the work she saw in lessons that she would like to come back and work with the students at a later date. We have now been asked to steer other schools through this Award.

Many trips have again taken place throughout each Year Group, ranging from Literary Lectures in London, to Harry Potter Tours, theatre visits, History trips and a Gifted and Talented visit of Year 10 to Oxford University. Next term the annual Blue Peris trip will take place - we will look out for the photos from that!

Year 11 have had both Mock results and some GCSE Module

results, and Year 12 and 13 their AS and A Level Module results. There was much to celebrate here. Now, a re-focusing towards those final Modules must take place. To aid students, the school will provide many opportunities to access extra work shops during both the Easter and half term breaks. But, of course, parents can play a vital part here too by providing time and a quiet space for students to revise and by offering those vital words of positive support when needed. Parents may approach staff at any time to request revision packages so that you know exactly what is being requested of your child and visit the VLE to access work from there too.

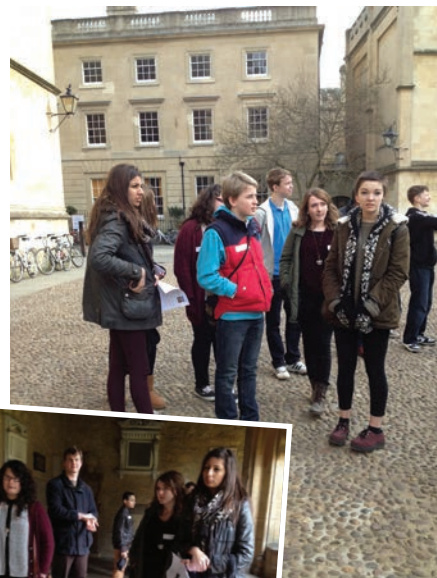


Oxford University

The team has been working very hard over the last few months and everyone has been doing their own bit to improve STM 002. New team members have settled in

very well and are working hard, staying every Wednesday night until 5pm to ensure the car is completed before June.

Mentoring Matters

In the autumn term some Year 13 students were offered the opportunity to put something back into the school community, by offering to provide mentoring to a small group of identified students in Year 11. They began with a training day, to help equip them with the skills and confidence they would need to help. Just after the October ½ term the programme got underway; the mentoring pairs have met once a week to discuss issues that are affecting learning and progress. Some mentors have coached on pieces of homework, sat in with students in particular a lesson or have helped coach the students through a particular situation. After each tracking point the mentoring pairs have discussed the results, changes in progress and have set some target areas to work on.

"my mentor encourages me to do better and evaluate what things I need to improve on. He has also helped me put together a revision plan".

"my mentor has helped me to feel more confident in my school work".

The programme will finish shortly, enabling both the Year 11's and Year 13's to focus on their final examinations; we would like to thank each and every one of them for giving up their time and energy to this programme over the last few months.

BUT this is not the end of the journey. On the 6th February a new wave of mentoring got underway, 30 Year 12 students agreed to take part in a similar programme looking at subject specific mentoring. The programme will be a 5 week intervention straight after February half term until the Easter break, where the students will work with together specifically on English, Maths and Science. Later in the year we plan on using these Year 12 students in a longer term project involving our current Year 10 students..... watch this space.

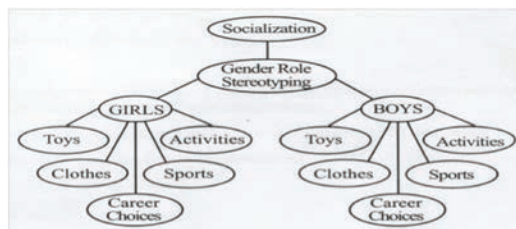

Gender socialisation

Year 9 students have been learning about gender socialisation – how girls learn to be girls and boys learn to be boys.

The students researched Ann Oakley's study from the 1970s which claimed that parents reinforce gender stereotypes found in wider society by the way in which they treat their children.

Student then conducted their own primary research using structured interviews to see if this was still the case some 40 years later. Their findings suggested that parents are still giving their sons gender specific toys and encouraging masculine traits, however, girls were no longer constrained by these stereotypes and were given more freedom to play with traditional boy's toys and engage in boy's activities, such as football. Whereas boys still wanted to work in traditional male jobs, girls were no longer opting for the traditional jobs of nursing and hairdressing and wanted to be solicitors and business women in the future.

England vs Australia Netball Trip

Girls from all year groups were invited to watch the second Netball game of the England versus Australia three match series. It followed a 58-53 victory in the first Test - which was only the third time England had beaten Australia. Seventeen of us arrived at Wembley arena excited and enthused by the rapturous 7,000-strong crowd. A victory at Wembley would give England a 2-0 lead in the three match series. Little did we know that the game that was about to commence would be the first time England would ever win the International Test Match against Australia. We sat in our seats, only 8 rows from courtside, watching the netballers warm up anticipating the start of this historic

match. After a pacy first quarter, Australia scored the opening goal and ran to a 15-11 lead. England fought their way back to 27-26 at the interval and continued their momentum to score five goals without reply on the way to a 40-37 lead at the end of the third. With Australia on the back foot, England were relentless. The home side kept up the pressure with Joanne Harten at goal attack and Kadeen Corbin at goal shooter enjoying success at the net, much to the delight of the St Thomas More students who cheered enthusiastically after every goal.

The GCSE PE students found the courtside experience particularly useful, being



able to see elite netballers in action. The England Netball Teams fast footwork, accuracy, speed and sheer determination left the St Thomas More Netballers in amazement.

Brilliant Baskets and Fantastic Feet

This term it was the turn of the U14 basketball team to compete for the district title. Having trained since the start of the academic year and seen the U18 and U16 teams not quite make it, the Year 9 boys finished with a record of four wins against Sharnbrook, Wootton, Biddenham and Bedford Academy, only losing one game to Mark Rutherford. In what has been a really well contested group so far, the boys' performances should see them progress to the semi-finals next half term.



In football, our U15 and U16 teams both made a good start in their efforts to secure the district cup by beating Bedford Academy 4-1 and 4-3 respectively. The U16's also secured a 6-2 victory against Wootton in a combined county and district cup match which sees them through to the county cup semi's. The U15s will play Sharnbrook in the quarter finals.
