My working day starts at 7am when I unlock the premises and check that the heating is on and warming up. I then head back to my office to check my emails in order to plan jobs for the rest of the day. At any time I will need to receive deliveries, for anything from a pallet of paper, to a lorry load of wood for the Technology Dept! Staff from all departments will make email requests for maintenance work needed (blown bulbs, loose shelving, broken door handles etc). I will prioritise my day with regards to the safety of staff and pupils when needed.



In fact health and safety is foremost in my mind when implementing our Maintenance Plan and regular testing of emergency

systems such as lighting and fire alarms. Recently the spell of snowy weather has tested our determination to keep the school open so the Headmaster, myself and the two other members of my team were out clearing snow and rock salting from 7am!

Some of the more unusual events during my working day include removing bags from trees, shoes from roofs, mending bicycles, repairing shoes, and freeing bikes from the bike rack after keys or codes are lost or forgotten!

My responsibilities also include the supervision of the cleaning team who start their duties at 3.45pm. If I am on a late shift I will be locking up the school between 9 and 10pm after the various clubs and outside organisations have left.

This was the second chance some of our students have had to meet someone from the BBFC as a group of our A Level students went to visit the BBFC in London last February.

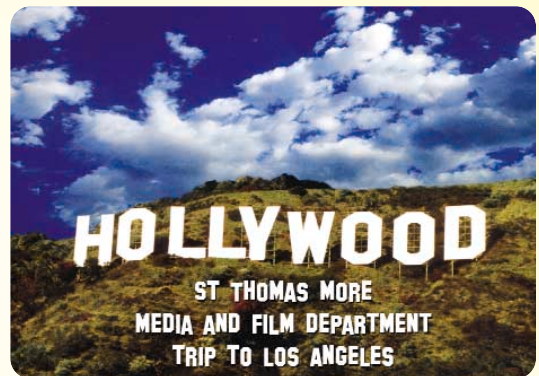
Overall the seminar was an informative and entertaining experience for the media and film studies students.

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St Thomas More Racing Team Update

Since the last edition of More News the team has been very busy and the construction of the 2012 car has made really good progress.

Construction of the 2012 Car

The main part of the STM003 car has now been completed and not only has it proved to be very strong but it is also very light. The main drive system and motor has now been completed by Mr Reed and again a great deal of weight has been saved compared to the 2011 car drive system. With the saving of all this weight the 2012 car will be capable of driving at a higher speed and therefore cover a great distance during the four hour races. This should mean that the team stands a very good chance of reaching the 2012 finals at Goodwood and will hopefully finish in the top twenty in the country.

Drive Practice and Testing

The team intends to race two cars during the 2012 racing season so a total of ten drives will be required. Recently the driver hopefuls all completed a test drive of the 2011 car in the Sport's Hall. All of the drivers proved very good drivers and the final ten have been selected for the 2012 season.

Team Trailer

With the help of Miss Wilshaw the team gained a £500 award from the council. The team has used this money to purchase and manufacture a trailer which will enable one of the cars to be transported to the race events. The trailer, when completed will be finished in the team car colours.

Sponsorship & Money Raising

The team have worked hard during the winter months to gain further sponsorship. Once again the team has been very successful and has gained a further four sponsors who have donated a useful amount of money to ensure that the team races during the 2012 season. The team is still looking for further sponsorship. If anyone is interested in sponsoring the team then please get in contact with Mr Prudden or one of the team members.

The team have also been busy organising other ways of raising money for the team. They completed a successful cake sale in February and will be very shortly undertaking a week of litter picking on the school site to raise further funds. Staff and Pupils - Please support them as much as possible!

Greenpower Eastern Region Ambassador

The team has achieved some impressive results over the last two years of racing as a result Mr Prudden has been offered and has accepted the roll of becoming the Ambassador for Greenpower within the Eastern Region. This roll will involve him promoting and assisting other schools and youth organisations who wish to design, build and race electric powered cars within the Greenpower races. He has already assisted a number of schools in Bedfordshire in preparation for the Bedford Grandprix. (Although he is trying hard not to give away too many secrets!)

The Future

The team have another two months in which to finish the construction of the 2012 car. The first race of the year will be held at the Bedford Autodrome at the end of June. This will be shortly followed by the Regional qualifying race at Rockingham in July. Fingers crossed for the team and hopefully they will reach the National Finals at Goodwood in October.

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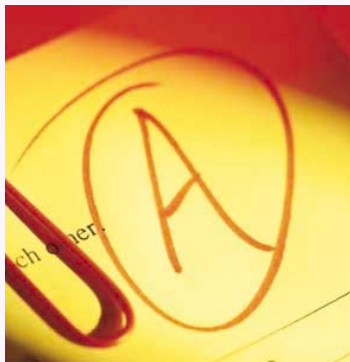


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Early Entry at A2

A Catholic Mystic Simone Weil wrote:

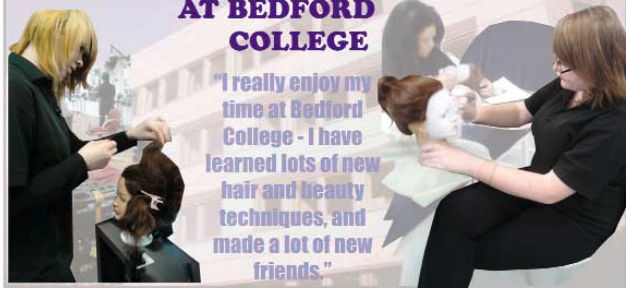
“To be rooted is perhaps the most important and least recognised need of the human soul.”

At St Thomas More School the sense of belonging is at the heart of inclusion. Inclusion though active is not far reaching enough, it does not always enable the student to take root in their place of learning and to positively contribute to the learning climate and the supportive landscape which is an enduring feature of this school (OFSTED/Inclusion Mark 2006/2009). At St Thomas More we aim to reflect the life of Christ who invites full belonging and fullness of life, thus the reality of a place of safety and security and the ambition for each student to thrive in their individual richness is fully embedded.

Features of this belonging are illustrated through the strength of the initiatives which support full presence, participation and achievement. The model of belonging is reflected in the mission of the school and is embodied in the work of the Emmaus Centre and all staff. All staff are here to serve the needs of the children in their care by walking the pathway with them, often this means a journey to marginalised places so that students can be accompanied back to full union with the rest of the school where they belong and where there is a place for them. In essence the work of the school is to create and support belonging so that students have the confidence to discern where and how they want to belong as their journey continues from this place.

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St Thomas More Ski Trip 2012: Austria

Our participation grows stronger and stronger, so why don't you get involved? Lift your voice above the crowd.

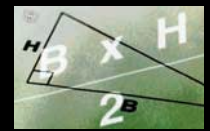


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Best ever Intermediate Maths Challenge Results of the School!!!!!!

In February this year, a group of 20 students in years 10 and 11 took part in the UK Intermediate Maths Challenge and I would like to share with you the success of several of the participants. For the first time in the history of the school one student has made it through to the to the next round of the competition called EUROPEAN 'KANGAROO' MATHEMATICAL CHALLENGE 'PINK'.



For those not familiar, the Intermediate Maths Challenge is targeted at the top 5% of years 10 and 11 across the country and the top performers can achieve Bronze, Silver or Gold certificates. They have one hour to answer around 40 questions written to challenge how well they can apply Mathematics and logical thinking to solve problems. The highest scoring 40% of candidates receive a certificate - Bronze 21%, Silver 13% and Gold 6%.

This year our Challengers achieved 3 Gold, 3 Silver and 3 Bronze certificates, an improvement over previous years:

This was what Luke Barnard had to say: 'On the 6th of December, the A2 maths students went to Milton Keynes to hear a lecture on Topology. Gareth Williams from the Open University took the lecture. He told us the differences between geometry and topology. In topology, shapes (2D or 3D) can be stretched and manipulated unlike those in geometry. He described this to us through the medium of noughts and crosses and as the lecture progressed, the simple game became easier to win but far more complicated to play.

We went from playing noughts and crosses on an ordinary grid, to playing on a doughnut."



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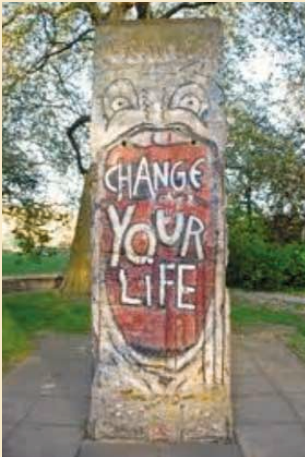
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IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM
